

Disposition of the physical body after death

- 1. Place the body on dry ice for two days. A secondary choice is refrigeration for two days.**
- 2. Cremate the body on the third day. This commemorates Jesus's resurrection.**
- 3. Family members and friends gather at the cremation to make calls for the soul to be taken to octaves of light and ask that the light be withdrawn from the body.**
- 4. Embalming is not recommended.**
- 5. Autopsies are not recommended except in cases of foul play. Make sure all fluids and organs removed from the body are replaced before cremation.**

In order to facilitate the soul's transition to higher octaves, we recommend that the physical body be placed on ice for a period of two days and two nights and then be cremated on the third day.

Most funeral parlors will obey the request. Dry ice may be used, or if that is not possible, the body may be kept refrigerated. On the third day the mortuary will take the body to the crematorium, if they do not have one. The third day is the day when Jesus was resurrected. So this commemorates his body being placed in the tomb and then being resurrected.

Family members and friends gather at the place of cremation to make calls for the soul to be taken to octaves of light and to be cut free from astral entanglements. They should also make calls for the light to be withdrawn from the body.

Often times, a memorial service is held within a few days to a week after cremation. It is important to make calls that the loved one who passed be taken to the appropriate place for their evolution, the proper schoolroom where they can make the best progress. There is a simple call that you can make to Archangel Michael and Elohim Astrea and their Angels to escort the soul to retreats of learning, or to a place of temporary rest if the soul has passed in great pain or trauma.

Due to custom and a mistaken concept the physical body will be raised at the second coming of Christ; many people have had their bodies buried at the close of many lifetimes.

They believe that cremation is the denial of resurrection. But there is no resurrection of the physical body. Rather, there is the resurrection of the soul in a spiritual body. The preservation of the physical form for the next life is absolutely unnecessary.

On the day of the resurrection one Christ shall summon the elect to rise from the earth, they shall arise in new garments, new light bodies, and they shall be with him in the great rapture of the Lord.

Embalming

Embalming is a means of further prolonging the soul's bondage to form. We definitely do not recommend embalming. If the body is embalmed before cremation the blood is removed and discarded as waste therefore it is not consigned to the flame with the remains. Since the blood

carries the light and identity pattern of the soul, which cannot be removed except by fire, it is wise to see that the body is not tampered with prior to being placed on ice.

As long as there is light in the body, it binds the soul to earth. Through cremation, the light is returned to the etheric plane. Thus, the soul has no reason to be earthbound and held back by the body.

Autopsy

We do not recommend an autopsy unless there has been foul play or question as to the cause of death. If an autopsy is necessary, however, insist that all organs and anything that has been disturbed during autopsy be placed with the body in the cremation ritual.

It is important that everyone make a will and that your family be aware of your wishes. Nevertheless, occasionally one of the family members may override the individual's wishes and proceed with embalming and burial rather than cremation. If this should happen, remember that the power of the Holy Spirit, when invoked through the Violet flame, is able to transmute cause, effect, record, and memory of all that is left of the human, wherever it may appear in the Earth's crust. Truly, the universal grace of God is sufficient for man's salvation.

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
